- (1) A statement of specific factual information given in response to the inquiry; or
- (2) A recitation of existing policy in response to the inquiry.
- B. Any deliberation of or decision about the subject of the inquiry shall be limited to a proposal to place the subject on the agenda for a subsequent meeting.

Proposed Policy: CITY OF WILLOW PARK, RULES FOR PUBLIC PARTICIPATION IN CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS

- 1. Generally. The City Council of the City of Willow Park welcomes input from the public on matters that come before the Council for decision and has adopted these rules to provide for reasonable public participation, while maintaining an orderly and efficient process for conducting its meetings.
- 2. Speaker request from. Those who wish to address the Council during a meeting are required to complete a speaker request form by providing their full name, home address, and a brief description of the subject or subjects about which they plan to speak. If the subject is an item that is included on the meeting agenda, the description should include a reference to the agenda item. A completed speaker request form must be delivered to the City Secretary at or before the beginning of the meeting at which the speaker desires to address the Council.
- 3. Time limitations. Speakers who wish to address the Council on matters that are not included on the meeting agenda are limited to one three-minute period no matter how many subjects they list. Speakers who wish to address the Council, on matters that are included on the meeting agenda, are limited to: a) one three-minute period, if speaking on a single agenda item; or b) if speaking on more than one item, a separate two-minute period for each agenda item they list on their speaker request form. The time limits for a non-English speaker, who uses the services of a translator, shall be twice as long as the time limits that would otherwise be applicable. If an unusually large number of speakers file speaker request forms requesting to speak at a council meeting, the presiding officer may reduce the applicable time limits as necessary to complete the meeting within a reasonable time period.
- **4. Order of presentation.** Ordinarily speakers will be allowed to make their comments at the beginning of the City Council meeting. Provided however that the presiding officer may, in particular cases delay the receipt of comments on a particular agenda item until the point in the meeting that City Council take up that agenda item for consideration.

5. **Decorum requirements.** Speakers must address the Council from the podium provided for that purpose and must not utilize any sound amplification equipment other than that provided by the City. A speaker who wishes to provide papers, photographs, or other tangible items to the Council for consideration during their address must provide those items to the City Secretary who will distribute them to the Council. Speakers are free to criticize the City, any of its officers or employees, and any of it acts, omissions, policies, procedures, programs, or services. However, shouting, the issuance of threats of physical violence, and any similar behavior that is unduly disruptive to the meeting is prohibited. The Council cannot deliberate or engage on any matters brought before them at this time.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS, ESTABLISHING RULES FOR PUBLIC PARTICIPATION IN CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS.

WHEREAS, it is the policy of the City to encourage input from citizens on matters that come before the City Council for decision;

WHEREAS, in 2019, the state legislature adopted amendments to the laws governing meetings of city councils and other public bodies that specifically address public participation in the meetings of those bodies;

WHEREAS, the City Council considers it advisable to adopt formal rules for public participation in its meetings;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS:

Section 1.

The Rules for Public Participation in City Council Meetings attached to this Resolution are hereby adopted and shall be effective immediately.

Section 2.

City of Willow Park

The City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to post a copy of the Rules on the City's website and to provide notice of the Rules to members of the public who attend meetings of the City Council.

This Resolution shall be effective upon its passage and approval by City Council.

- **4. Order of presentation.** Ordinarily speakers will be allowed to make their comments at the beginning of the City Council meeting. Provided however that the presiding officer may, in particular cases delay the receipt of comments on a particular agenda item until the point in the meeting that City Council take up that agenda item for consideration.
- 5. Decorum requirements. Speakers must address the Council from the podium provided for that purpose and must not utilize any sound amplification equipment other than that provided by the City. A speaker who wishes to provide papers, photographs, or other tangible items to the Council for consideration during their address must provide those items to the City Secretary who will distribute them to the Council. Speaker shall observe the same rules of propriety, decorum and good conduct applicable to members of the City Council. Shouting, the issuance of threats of physical violence, the use of profanity and any similar behavior that is unduly disruptive to the meeting is prohibited. The Council cannot deliberate or engage on any matters brought before them, unless the matter is on the agenda.

House Bill 2840: Public Comment on Agenda Items

1. What is House Bill 2840?

House Bill 2840 by Representative Terry Canales (D – Edinburg) passed during the Eighty-Sixth Regular Legislative Session. It became effective on September 1, 2019. The bill, codified at Texas Government Code Section 551.007, amends the Texas Open Meetings Act (Act) to address public testimony at open meetings. Before the passage of the bill, the public had a legal right only to observe, rather than speak at, an open meeting of a governmental body. *See* Tex. Att'y Gen. Op. No. JC-0169 (2000).

House Bill 2840 gives the public the right to speak on an item on the agenda at an open meeting of the following municipal governmental bodies:

- a city council;
- a deliberative body that has rulemaking or quasi-judicial power and that is classified as a
 department, agency, or political subdivision of a city (e.g., probably a city's board of
 adjustment); and
- the governing body of a special district created by law (Each city should consult local legal counsel as to the applicability of this provision. *See, e.g., Sierra Club v. Austin Transp. Study Policy Advisory Committee*, 746 S.W.2d 298 (Tex. App. —Austin 1988, writ denied (concluding that Austin transportation advisory committee was a "special district")).

TEX. GOV'T CODE §§ 551.001(3)(C), (D), (H), 551.007(a). The bill also applies to a handful of other non-municipal governmental bodies. *See id.* §§ 551.001(3), 551.007(a).

Notably, the bill doesn't apply to state agencies. It also doesn't appear to apply to entities that are subject to the Act, but don't fall within the term "governmental body" as defined in the Act, such as a planning and zoning commission or an economic development corporation. *See, e.g.*, TEX. LOC. GOV'T CODE §§ 211.0075, 501.072; *see also* Tex. Att'y Gen. Op. No. JC-0327 (2001) (concluding that the board of the Bryan-College State Economic Development Corporation is not a governmental body under the Act). City officials should consult local legal counsel to determine whether any particular entity is subject to the bill.

2. Does House Bill 2840 mandate that a governmental body have a "public hearing" on every agenda item?

No. Public hearings are meetings legally required by law to record public comment on a matter being considered by a governmental entity. These same laws govern how the public hearings are to be conducted. See, e.g., TEX. LOC. GOV'T CODE §§ 102.006(a) ("The governing body of a municipality shall hold a public hearing on the proposed budget. Any person may attend and may participate in the hearing."), 43.063(a) ("Before a municipality may institute annexation proceedings, the governing body of the municipality must conduct two public hearings at which persons interested in the annexation are given the opportunity to be heard.").

Existing precedent makes clear the distinction between a public hearing and public comment at a meeting. *See* Tex. Att'y Gen. Op. Nos. M-220 (1968) at 5 (A meeting that is "open to the public" under the Act is one that the public is entitled to attend.); JM-584 (1986) at 3; H-188 (1973) at 2; LO-96-111 at 1; *see also*

Eudaly v. City of Colleyville, 642 S.W.2d 75, 77 (Tex. App.—Fort Worth 1982, writ ref'd n.r.e.) (distinguishing between "public meeting," where public was not entitled to comment, and "public hearing," where public was entitled to comment).

House Bill 2840 doesn't require a public hearing on every item on an agenda. It merely grants limited authority to a citizen to address a governmental body, subject to reasonable rules adopted by the body.

3. When does the public have the right to speak on items on the agenda of an open meeting?

Some commentators have suggested that the bill allows a citizen to speak throughout a meeting on agenda items before a vote, not only in the time designated by the city. Government Code Section 551.007(b) provides that "A governmental body shall allow each member of the public who desires to address the body regarding an item on an agenda for an open meeting of the body to address the body regarding the item at the meeting *before or during the body's consideration of the item*." TEX. GOV'T CODE § 551.007(b) (emphasis added).

The legislature typically uses the word "or" as a disjunctive. *See Spradlin v. Jim Walter Homes, Inc.*, 34 S.W.3d 578, 581 (Tex. 2000). "It separates words or phrases in the alternate relationship, indicating that either of the separated words or phrases may be employed without the other." *Jones v. State*, 175 S.W.3d 927, 932 (Tex. App.—Dallas 2005, no pet.) (citing *Perez v. State*, 11 S.W.3d 218, 225 (Tex. Crim. App. 2000)). The legislature's use of the disjunctive here evidences its intent to allow the governmental body to decide at which point in the meeting a member of the public speaks.

Section 551.007(b) does not grant a member of the public the right to speak *both* before and during the governmental body's consideration of an item. Moreover, a member of the public has no right under Section 551.007(b) to speak *after* the body's consideration of an item. *See also* TEX. GOV'T CODE § 551.007(c) (authorizing the governmental body to adopt "rules concerning the public's right to speak at an open meeting"), TEX. LOC. GOV'T CODE § 22.038(c) ("The governing body shall determine the rules of its proceedings"), Tex. Att'y Gen. Op. No. DM-473 (1998) (concluding a home rule city is authorized to adopt reasonable rules of procedure for meetings).

The legislative history of House Bill 2840 explains why a governmental body may limit a speaker to one of the two options: "It has been suggested that the practice of the governing bodies of certain political subdivisions to provide for public input and comment only at the conclusion of a meeting of the governing body makes it too difficult for the public to properly weigh in on decisions being made because they are forced to wait through the entire meeting to provide an opinion on any subject matter being addressed at the meeting." *See* Senate Business & Commerce Comm., Bill Analysis, H.B. 2840, Senate Research Center, May 15, 2019.

4. Is a governmental body allowed to adopt reasonable rules regarding the public's right to speak at open meetings?

Yes. A governmental body may adopt reasonable rules concerning the public's right to speak at an open meeting, consistent with the relevant provisions of law allowing it to do so. *Id.* § 551.007(c); *See* Tex. Att'y Gen. Op. Nos. H-188 (1973) at 2, LO-96-111 at 1. The rules may include, among many other things, how long a person may address the governmental body on a given item. *Id.* § 551.007(d) (If the person addressing the governmental body needs a translator, the governmental body is required to allow at least twice the normal amount of time for the non-English speaker to address the body.).

Prior to the passage of House Bill 2840, the attorney general summarized the authority of a local governmental body to control public comment at its meetings:

We think that the [governmental body] has broad discretion in exercising its statutory powers under the Local Government Code, and may limit the number of persons who may speak on a topic and the length and frequency of their presentations. However, it must act reasonably and may not discriminate on the basis of the particular views expressed, nor arbitrarily deny citizens their right to apply to the government for redress of grievances by "petition, address or remonstrance," as guaranteed by article I, section 27 of the Texas Constitution. [governmental body] as a whole has the authority to determine its own agenda. Attorney General Opinions DM-228 (1993) at 2-3, JM-63 (1983) at 1. The [body] may adopt reasonable rules consistent with relevant provisions of law - including, among other things, the Open Meetings Act - to govern the conduct of its meetings. Attorney General Opinion DM-228 (1993) at 3. The court may limit the number, frequency, and length of presentations to it. Attorney General Opinion H-188 (1973) at 2. We note that, as Attorney General Opinion H-188 points out, the Open Meetings Act does not of itself give citizens the right to participate in a public meeting, but only the right to observe it. However, if the [body] has adopted a policy of opening the floor to citizen comment, Attorney General Opinion H-188 counsels that such a policy must be administered in an even-handed fashion, and that the [body] may not discriminate against a particular point of view. Such limits as the [governmental body] adopts must not be arbitrary or unreasonable, and must not unfairly discriminate among views seeking expression.

Tex. Att'y Gen. Op. No. LO-96-111. Of course, House Bill 2840 modifies the conclusion that the Act doesn't give members of the public the right to speak at an open meeting. Beyond that, however, the remaining conclusions remain valid. *See also* Tex. Loc. Gov't Code § 22.038(c) ("The governing body [of a general law city] shall determine the rules of its proceedings"), Tex. Att'y Gen. Op. No. DM-473 (1998) (concluding a home rule city is authorized to adopt reasonable rules of procedure as long as they are not inconsistent with the constitution, statutes or city charter provisions).

The bottom line is that a member of the public's right to address a governmental body under Section 511.007 is, by the express terms of the section, subject to reasonable rules adopted by the governmental body.

5. Does House Bill 2840 require a governmental body to allow a member of the public to speak during the body's consideration of an agenda item if the person wishes to do so?

Likely not. The city council could comply with Section 551.007 by allowing a member of the public to address the body regarding the item any time before the body's consideration of the item. What if a member of the public misses the opportunity to speak on an item during a designated public comment period at the beginning of an open meeting? Is a governmental body then required to allow that person to speak on the item later in the meeting during the body's consideration of the item? Likely not, because the governmental body retains control of its meetings. The governmental body may set a designated time (e.g., before agenda items are considered) for speakers to address the body regarding an item on the agenda. If a speaker misses that opportunity, Section 551.007 does not grant the person the right to interrupt the meeting.

What if a member of the public is in attendance during a designated public comment period at the beginning of an open meeting, but chooses not to comment on an agenda item until later in the meeting during the body's consideration of the item? Is the governmental body required to allow that person to speak on the item during the body's consideration of the item? Likely not, because the governmental body retains control of its meetings.

6. Is a governmental body required to allow the public to speak on agenda items at "workshops" or "work sessions?"

Cities sometimes post meeting notices indicating that the city council will hold a "council work session" or "council workshop." These terms are not defined in the Act, but are commonly used to refer to a meeting in which the council will be briefed by staff (or other experts) on a single matter of interest to the city. Oftentimes, the subject of a work session is highly technical in nature and/or requires a detailed and thorough explanation. A city council generally will not plan to take action during a work session as it is frequently intended as an educational precursor to some possible future action. For instance, city councils often hold meetings referred to as "work sessions" leading up to the adoption of the budget.

City attorneys disagree about whether Section 551.007 applies to a workshop or work sessions. While some believe it applies, others have a different interpretation. That interpretation is largely based on when the governmental body "considers" an item. For example, a city may hold budget workshops for city councilmembers to discuss financial priorities amongst themselves. Some argue that the city council isn't "considering" the item at that time. Rather, they argue, the budget itself will be considered when it is placed on the city council's agenda for action at a future meeting. The bill author's staff has indicated that the bill isn't meant to apply to a workshop or work session.

7. May the governmental body still allow the public to ask questions about items not on the agenda? Must a governmental body allow the public to ask questions about items not on the agenda?

It has long been "common for units of local government to invite any member of the public to make whatever comments they desire in the public forum at the time of the public meeting," including comments about items not on the agenda. Tex. Att'y Gen. Op. Nos. JC-0169 (2000). A governmental body may, but does not have to, allow the public to make comments about items not on the agenda. House Bill 2840 mandates that a governmental body allow a citizen to speak only in regard to items on an agenda.

If the governmental body allows the public to comment on items not on the agenda, the governmental body can still apply reasonable rules regarding the number, frequency, and length of presentation, but it cannot discriminate against speakers. *See, e.g.,* Tex. Att'y Gen. Op. No. LO-96-111. The governmental body may not deliberate on any item that is not on the agenda. For such an item, the governmental body may: (1) make a statement of fact regarding the item; (2) make a statement concerning the policy regarding the item; or (3) propose that the item be placed on a future agenda. Tex. Gov't Code § 551.042.


8. May the governmental body prevent the public from criticizing the governmental body or actions of the governmental body?

A governmental body may not prohibit public criticism of the governmental body, including criticism of any act, omission, policy, procedure, program, or service. However, the bill "does not apply to public criticism that is otherwise prohibited by law." *Id.* § 551.007(e). What public criticism is prohibited by law remains to be seen. Defamation would probably fall under that prohibition. In any case, a city should be able to enforce a decorum policy for public speakers, so long is it doesn't prohibit criticism.



WHEREAS, (§Chapter 43 of the Texas Local Government Code) and the City of Willow Park, Texas, an incorporated city, authorizes the annexation of territory, subject to the laws of this state.

WHEREAS, the procedures prescribed by the (Texas Local Government Code) and the City of Willow Park, Texas, and the laws of this state have been duly followed with respect to the following described territory, to wit:

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS:

- 1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE AGREEMENT

FIRE

Existing Services: Parker County Emergency Services District 1

Services to be Provided: Fire suppression will be available to the area upon annexation. Primary fire response will be provided by City of Willow Park Fire Department Fire Station No. 1, located at 101 Stagecoach Trail. Adequate fire suppression activities can be afforded to the annexed area within current budget appropriation. Fire prevention activities will be provided by the Fire Marshall's office.

POLICE

Services to be Provided: Currently, the area is under the jurisdiction of the Parker County Sheriff's Office. Upon annexation, the City of Willow Park Police Department will extend regular and routine patrols to the area. It is anticipated that the implementation of police patrol activities can be effectively accommodated within the current budget and staff appropriation.

BUILDING INSPECTION

Existing Services: None

Services to be Provided: The Building Inspection Department will provide Code Compliance Services upon annexation. This includes issuing building, electrical, mechanical and plumbing permits for any new construction and remodeling, and enforcing all other applicable codes which regulated building construction within the City of Willow Park.

PLANNING AND ZONING

Existing Services: None

Services to be Provided: The Planning and Zoning Department's responsibility for regulating development and land use through the administration of the City of Willow Park Zoning Ordinance will extend to this area on the effective date of the annexation. The property will also continue to be regulated under the requirements of the City of Willow Park Subdivision Ordinance. These services can be provided within the department's current budget and staff appropriation.

HEALTH CODE ENFORCEMENT SERVICE

Services to be Provided: The City of Willow Park will implement the enforcement of the City's health ordinances and regulations on the effective date of the annexation. Such services can be provided with current personnel and within the current budget appropriation.

STREET

Existing Services: County Street Maintenance

Services to be Provided: Maintenance to the streets will be provided by the City of Willow Park on the effective date of the annexation. This service can be provided within the current budget appropriation.

STORM WATER MANAGEMENT

Services to be Provided: Developers will provide storm water drainage improvements at their own expense and will be inspected by the City Engineers at the time of completion. The City will then maintain the drainage improvements, upon approval, and acceptance.

STREET LIGHTING

Services to be Provided: The City of Willow Park will coordinate any request for improved street lighting within the local electric provider in accordance with standard policy.

TRAFFIC ENGINEERING

Services to be Provided: The City of Willow Park Public Works Department will provide, after the effective date of annexation, any additional traffic control devices.

WATER SERVICE

Services to be Provided: Water service to the area will be provided in accordance with applicable codes and departmental policy. When property develops in the area, water service shall be proved in accordance with utility extension ordinances. Extension of service shall comply with City codes and ordinances.

SANITARY SEWER SERVICE

Services to be Provided: Sanitary sewer service to the area will be provided in accordance with applicable codes and departmental policy. When property develops in the area, sanitary sewer service shall be provided in accordance with utility extension ordinances. Extension of service shall comply with City codes and ordinances.

SOLID WASTE SERVICES

Services to be Provided: Solid Waste Collection shall be provided to the area upon annexation in accordance with the present ordinance. Service shall comply with existing City policies, beginning with occupancy of structures.

MISCELLANEOUS

All other applicable municipal services will be provided to the area in accordance with the City of Willow Park's established policies governing extension of municipal services to newly annexed areas.







RESOLUTION NO. -21

A RESOLUTION SETTING A PUBLIC HEARING UNDER SECTION 311.003 OF THE TEXAS TAX CODE FOR THE REDUCTION OF THE BOUNDARIES OF TAX INCREMENT REINVESTMENT ZONE NUMBER ONE WITHIN THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS; AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF NOTICE BY THE CITY SECRETARY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS REGARDING THE PUBLIC HEARING; AND DIRECTING THE CITY TO PREPARE AN ORDINANCE CONFIRMING THE TIRZ BOUNDARY REDUCTION

WHEREAS, the City of Willow Park, Texas (the "City"), is authorized under Chapter 311 of the Texas Tax Code, as amended (the "Act"), to reduce the boundaries of a tax increment reinvestment zone within its City limits;

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City (the "City Council") wishes to hold a public hearing in accordance with Section 311.003 of the Act regarding reducing the boundaries of Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone Number One created by Ordinance 739-16 on October 25, 2016, by 47.42 acres as allowed by Section 311.007 of the Act (as amended, the "Zone") with the amended boundaries being described in the metes and bounds attached as **Exhibit A**; and depicted as shown in the attached **Exhibit B**, and

WHEREAS, in order to hold a public hearing for the boundary reduction to create the amended Zone, notice must be given in a newspaper of general circulation in the City not later than the 7th day before the date of the hearing in accordance with Section 311.003 of the Act; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined to hold a public hearing on December 14, 2021 on the boundary reduction.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS THAT:

Section 1.

A public hearing is hereby called for December 14, 2021, at 7:00 p.m. (or later) in the Willow Park City Hall located at 516 Ranch House Road, Willow Park, Texas, for the purpose of hearing any interested person speak for or against the exclusion of property in the amended Zone.

Section 2.

At such time and place the City Council will hear testimony regarding the exclusion of property from the Zone and will provide a reasonable opportunity for the owner of any property within the proposed Zone to protest the exclusion of their property from within the Zone. Upon closing the public hearing, the City Council may consider the adoption of an ordinance authorizing the amended Zone.

Section 3.

Attached hereto as **Exhibit C** is a form of the Notice of Public Hearing, the form and substance of which is hereby adopted and approved.

Section 4.

The City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to cause said notice to be published in substantially the form attached hereto in a newspaper of general circulation in the City on or before December 7, 2021.

Section 5.

Before the December 14, 2021, hearing concerning the Zone, the City shall prepare or cause to be prepared an updated final reinvestment zone financing plan.

Section 6.

This Resolution shall become effective from and after its date of passage and approval in accordance with law.





A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS ("CITY") JOINING WITH THE STATE OF TEXAS AND POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS OF THE STATE AS A PARTY IN THE TEXAS OPIOID SETTLEMENT AGREEMENTS SECURED BY THE OFFICE OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL; AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE SETTLEMENT PARTICIPATION FORMS; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Willow Park, Texas is a Type A general law municipal corporation formed and organized pursuant to the constitution and laws of the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, the people of the State of Texas and its communities, including Willow Park, have been harmed through the national and statewide epidemic caused by the sale, use and distribution of opioids within the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, the City has been provided information indicating that certain drug companies and their corporate affiliates, parents, subsidiaries, and such other defendants as may be added to the litigation (collectively, "Defendants") have engaged in fraudulent and reckless marketing as well as fraudulent distribution of opioids that have resulted in addictions and overdoses; and

WHEREAS, these actions, conduct and misconduct have resulted in the death of many Texans and has resulted in the devastation of families and communities across the State; and

WHEREAS, local governments have been on the front lines of the opioid crisis, which has resulted in significant financial costs to them related to the expenditures and continuing costs for healthcare services, social services, law enforcement and the criminal justice systems; and

WHEREAS, on May 13,2020, the State of Texas, through the Office of the Attorney General, and a negotiation group for Texas political subdivisions entered into an agreement entitled Texas Opioid Abatement Fund Council and Settlement Allocation Term Sheet (hereafter, the Texas Term Sheet) approving the allocation of any and all opioid settlement funds within the State of Texas. The Texas Term Sheet is attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated for all purposes; and

WHEREAS, the City Attorney and the State of Texas have recommended that the City Council of the City of Willow Park support the adoption and approval of the Texas Term Sheet in its entirety; and

WHEREAS, participating in the Texas Term Sheet increases the State of Texas' opportunity to maximize its share of opioid settlement funds and will provide a method to ensure that needed resources reach communities once all negotiations are finalized; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds and determines that it is in the best interest of the health, safety, and welfare of the City to participate in the Texas Term Sheet.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS, THAT:

Section 1. The City Council hereby authorizes the City Manager to execute the Subdivision

Settlement Participation Form, attached hereto as Exhibit "B" in accordance with the provisions set forth in the attached exhibit "A", and incorporated herein for all purposes and further authorizes the City Manager to take any additional actions necessary to implement the intent of this Resolution.

Section 2. The recitals contained in the preamble hereof are hereby found to be true, and such recitals are hereby made a part of this Resolution for all purposes and are adopted as part of the judgment and finding of the City Council.

<u>Section 3.</u> All resolutions, or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Resolution are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Resolution shall be and remain controlling as to the matters resolved herein.

<u>Section 4.</u> This Resolution shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas and the United States of America.

<u>Section 5.</u> If any provision of this Resolution or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this Resolution and the application of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall nevertheless be valid, and the City Council hereby declares that this Resolution would have been enacted without such invalid provision.

<u>Section 6.</u> It is officially found, determined, and declared that the meeting at which this Resolution is adopted was open to the public and public notice of the time, place, and subject matter of the public business to be considered at such meeting, including this Resolution, was given, all as required by Chapter 551, Texas Government Code, as amended.

<u>Section 7.</u> This resolution shall be in force and effect from and after its final passage, and it is so resolved.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED OPIOID SETTLEMENTS



SUMMARY OF PROPOSED OPIOID SETTLEMENTS

BACKGROUND

Texas, along with a broad coalition of states and subdivisions, has reached final agreements with four companies to resolve legal claims against for their role in the opioid crisis. One agreement is with opioid manufacturer Johnson & Johnson. The other is three major pharmaceutical distributors: AmerisourceBergen, Cardinal Health, and McKesson.

FINANCIAL TERMS

The two agreements provide for \$26 billion in payments over 18 years, with \$23.9 billion available for opioid abatement and significant amounts front loaded. Funding will be distributed to states according to the allocation agreement reached among the Attorneys General. Subdivisions can only participate in the agreement if their state participates. Texas' combined share is almost \$1.5 billion: \$1.17 billion from the distributors and \$268 million from J&J. Distribution within Texas is handled through an intrastate agreement between the state and litigating subdivisions. The funding must be used to support any of a wide variety of strategies to fight the opioid crisis. Separate provisions exist to compensate attorneys who have pursued opioid litigation on behalf of states and local governments.

Once the state agrees to participate, then the more subdivisions that join, the more money everyone in Texas will receive. Future opioid litigation may result in suspension and reduction of

payments. Even without full resolution of claims, states and subdivisions can still receive substantial payments by resolving a significant portion of current and future claims.

INJUNCTIVE TERMS

Both agreements both contain industry-changing injunctive terms. The distributors will be subject to more oversight and accountability, including an independent monitor, to prevent deliveries of opioids to pharmacies where diversion and misuse occur. They will be required to establish and fund an independent clearinghouse to track opioid distribution nationwide and flag suspicious orders. J&J will be prohibited from selling or promoting opioids.

HOW TO JOIN

To adopt the settlement and allocation schedule, you need to:

- 1. sign the Subdivision Settlement Participation Form;
- adopt the Texas Term Sheet and its intrastate allocation schedule;
- return both to opioids@oag.texas.gov.

The deadline for states to sign on is August 21, 2021. Subdivisions in participating states then have through January 2, 2022, to join.

TEXAS OPIOD ABATEMENT FUND COUNCIL AND SETTLEMENT ALLOCATION TERM SHEET

TEXAS OPIOID ABATEMENT FUND COUNCIL AND SETTLEMENT ALLOCATION TERM SHEET

WHEREAS, the people of the State of Texas and its communities have been harmed through the National and Statewide epidemic caused by licit and illicit opioid use and distribution within the State of Texas; and now,

WHEREAS, the State of Texas, though its elected representatives and counsel, including the Honorable Ken Paxton, Attorney General of the State of Texas, and certain Political Subdivisions, through their elected representatives and counsel, are separately engaged in litigation seeking to hold those entities in the supply chain accountable for the damage caused; and now,

WHEREAS, the State of Texas, through its Attorney General and its Political Subdivisions, share a common desire to abate and alleviate the impacts of the epidemic throughout the State of Texas; and now,

THEREFORE, the State of Texas and its Political Subdivisions, subject to completing formal documents effectuating the Parties' agreements, enter into this State of Texas and Texas Political Subdivisions' Opioid Abatement Fund Council and Settlement Allocation Term Sheet (Texas Term Sheet) relating to the allocation and use of the proceeds of any Settlements as described.

A. Definitions

As used in this Texas Term Sheet:

- "The State" shall mean the State of Texas acting through its Attorney General.
- 2. "Political Subdivision(s)" shall mean any Texas municipality and county.
- 3. "The Parties" shall mean the State of Texas, the Political Subdivisions, and the Plaintiffs' Steering Committee and Liaison Counsel (PSC) in the Texas Opioid MDL, *In Re: Texas Opioid Litigation*, MDL No. 2018-63587, in the 152d District Court of Harris County, Texas.
- 4. "Litigating Political Subdivision" means a Political Subdivision that filed suit in the state courts of the State of Texas prior to the Execution Date of this Agreement, whether or not such case was transferred to Texas Opioid MDL, or removed to federal court.
- 5. "National Fund" shall mean any national fund established for the benefit of the Texas Political Subdivisions. In no event shall any National Fund be used to create federal jurisdiction, equitable or otherwise, over the Texas Political Subdivisions or those similarly situated state-court litigants who are included in the state coalition, nor shall the National Fund require participating in a class action or signing a participation agreement as part of the criteria for participating in the National Fund.
- 6. "Negotiating Committee" shall mean a three-member group comprising four representatives for each of (1) the State; (2) the PSC; and (3) Texas'

Political Subdivisions (collectively, "Members"). The State shall be represented by the Texas Attorney General or his designees. The PSC shall be represented by attorneys Mikal Watts, Jeffrey Simon, Dara Hegar, Dan Downey, or their designees. Texas' Political Subdivisions shall be represented by Clay Jenkins (Dallas County Judge), Terrence O'Rourke (Special Assistant County Attorney, Harris County), Nelson Wolff (Bexar County Judge), and Nathaniel Moran (Smith County Judge) or their designees.

- 7. "Settlement" shall mean the negotiated resolution of legal or equitable claims against a Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participant that includes the State and Political Subdivisions.
- 8. "Opioid Funds" shall mean monetary amounts obtained through a Settlement as defined in this Texas Term Sheet.
- 8. "Approved Purpose(s)" shall mean those uses identified in Exhibit A hereto.
- 9. "Pharmaceutical Supply Chain" shall mean the process and channels through which opioids or opioids products are manufactured, marketed, promoted, distributed, or dispensed.

- 10. "Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participant" shall mean any entity that engages in or has engaged in the manufacture, marketing, promotion, distribution, or dispensing of an opioid analgesic.
- 11. "Texas Opioid Council" shall mean the Council described in Exhibit A hereto, which has the purpose of ensuring the funds recovered by Texas (through the joint actions of the Attorney General and the Texas Political Subdivisions) are allocated fairly and spent to remediate the opioid crisis in Texas, using efficient and cost-effective methods that are directed to the hardest hit regions in Texas while also ensuring that all Texans benefit from prevention and recovery efforts.

B. Allocation of Settlement Proceeds

1. All Opioid Funds distributed in Texas shall be divided with 15% going to Political Subdivisions ("Subdivision Share"), 70% to the Texas Opioid Abatement Fund through the Texas Opioid Council (Texas Abatement Fund Share) identified and described on Exhibits A and C hereto, and 15% to the Office of the Texas Attorney General as Counsel for the State of Texas ("State Share"). Out of the Texas Opioid Abatement Fund, reasonable expenses up to 1% shall be paid to the Texas Comptroller for the administration of the Texas Opioid Council pursuant to the Opioid

- Abatement Fund (Texas Settlement) Opioid Council Agreement, Exhibit A hereto.
- 2. The Subdivisions Share shall be allocated in accordance with the division of proceeds on Exhibit B hereto.
- 3. The Texas Abatement Fund Share shall be allocated to the Opioid Council to be apportioned in accordance with the guidelines of Exhibit A, and Exhibit C hereto.
- 4. In the event a Subdivision merges, dissolves, or ceases to exist, the allocation percentage for that Subdivision shall be redistributed as directed by the settlement document, and if not specified, equitably based on the composition of the successor Subdivision. If a Subdivision for any reason is excluded from a specific settlement, the allocation percentage for that Subdivision shall be redistributed as directed by the settlement document, and if not specified, equitably among the participating Subdivisions.
- 5. Funds obtained from parties unrelated to the Litigation, via grant, bequest, gift or the like, separate and distinct from the Litigation, may be directed to the Texas Opioid Council and disbursed as set forth below.
- 6. The Subdivision share shall be initially deposited and paid in cash directly to the Subdivision under the authority and guidance of the Texas MDL Court, who shall direct any Settlement funds to be held in trust in a

- segregated account to benefit the Subdivisions and to be promptly distributed as set forth herein and in accordance with Exhibit B.
- 7. Nothing in this Texas Term Sheet should alter or change any Subdivision's rights to pursue its own claim. Rather, the intent of this Texas Term Sheet is to join all parties to disburse settlement proceeds from one or more defendants to all parties participating in that settlement within Texas.
- 8. Opioid Funds from the Texas Abatement Fund Share shall be directed to the Texas Opioid Council and used in accordance with the guidelines as set out on Exhibit A hereto, and the Texas Abatement Fund Share shall be distributed to the Texas Opioid Council under the authority and guidance of the Texas MDL Court, consistent with Exhibits A and C, and the bylaws of the Texas Opioid Council documents and disbursed as set forth therein, including without limitation all abatement funds and the 1% holdback for expenses.
- 9. The State of Texas and the Political Subdivisions understand and acknowledge that additional steps may need to be undertaken to assist the Texas Opioid Council in its mission, at a predictable level of funding, regardless of external factors.

C. Payment of Counsel and Litigation Expenses

- 1. Any Master Settlement Agreement settlement will govern the payment of fees and litigation expenses to the Parties. The Parties agree to direct control of any Texas Political Subdivision fees and expenses to the "Texas Opioid Fee and Expense Fund," which shall be allocated and distributed by the Texas MDL Court, *In re: Texas Opioid Litigation*, MDL No. 2018-63587, in the 152nd District Court of Harris County, Texas, and with the intent to compensate all counsel for Texas Political Subdivisions who have not chosen to otherwise seek compensation for fees and expenses from any federal MDL common benefit fund.
 - 2. The Parties agree that no portion of the State of Texas 15% allocation share from any settlement shall be administered through the National Fund, the Texas MDL Court, or Texas Opioid Fee and Expense Fund, but shall be directed for payment to the State of Texas by the State of Texas.
 - 3. The State of Texas and the Texas Political Subdivisions, and their respective attorneys, agree that all fees whether contingent, hourly, fixed or otherwise owed by the Texas Political Subdivisions shall be paid out of the National Fund or as otherwise provided for herein to the Texas Opioid Fee and Expense Fund to be distributed by the 152nd

- District Court of Harris County, Texas pursuant to its past and future orders.
- 4. From any opioid-related settlements with McKesson, Cardinal Health, ABDC, and Johnson & Johnson, and for any future opioid-related settlements negotiated, in whole or in part, by the Negotiating Committee with any other Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participant, the funds to be deposited in the Texas Opioid Fee and Expense Fund shall be 9.3925% of the combined Texas Political Subdivision and Texas Abatement Fund portions of each payment (annual or otherwise) to the State of Texas for that settlement, plus expenses from the National Fund, and shall be sought by Texas Political Subdivision Counsel initially through the National Fund. The Texas Political Subdivisions' percentage share of fees and expenses from the National Fund shall be directed to the Texas Opioid Fee and Expense Fund in the Texas MDL, as soon as is practical, for allocation and distribution in accordance with the guidelines herein.
- 5. If the National Fund share to the Texas Political Subdivisions is insufficient to cover the guaranteed 9.3925%, plus expenses from the National Fund, per subsection 4, immediately *supra*, or if payment from the National Fund is not received within 12 months after the date the

first payment is made by the Defendants pursuant to the settlement, then the Texas Political Subdivisions shall recover up to 12.5% of the Texas Political Subdivision Share to make up any difference.

6. If the National Fund and the Texas Political Subdivision share are insufficient to cover the guaranteed 9.3925%, plus expenses from the National Fund, or if payment from the National Fund is not received within 12 months after the date the first payment is made by the Defendants pursuant to the settlement, then the Texas Political Subdivisions shall recover up to 8.75% of the Abatement Fund Share to make up any difference. In no event shall the Texas Political Subdivision share exceed 9.3925% of the combined Texas Political Subdivision and Texas Abatement Fund portions of any settlement, plus expenses from the National Fund. In the event that any payment is received from the National Fund such that the total amount in fees and expenses exceeds 9.3925%, the Texas Political Subdivisions shall return any amounts received greater than 9.3925% of the combined Texas Political Subdivision and Texas Abatement Fund portions to those respective Funds.

- 7. For each settlement utilizing a National Fund, the Texas Political Subdivisions need only make one attempt at seeking fees and expenses there.
- 8. The total amount of the Texas Opioid Fee and Expense Fund shall be reduced proportionally, according to the agreed upon allocation of the Texas Subdivision Fund, for any Texas litigating Political Subdivision that (1) fails to enter the settlement; and (2) was filed in Texas state court, and was transferred to the Texas MDL (or removed before or during transfer to the Texas MDL) as of the execution date of this Agreement.

D. The Texas Opioid Council and Texas Abatement Fund

The Texas Opioid Council and Texas Abatement Fund is described in detail at Exhibit A, incorporated herein by reference.

E. Settlement Negotiations

1. The State and Negotiating Committee agree to inform each other in advance of any negotiations relating to a Texas-only settlement with a Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participant that includes both the State and its Political Subdivisions and shall provide each other the opportunity to participate in all such negotiations. Any Texas-only Settlement agreed to with the State and Negotiating Committee shall be subject to the approval

of a majority of litigating Political Subdivisions. The Parties further agree to keep each other reasonably informed of all other global settlement negotiations with Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participants and to include the Negotiating Committee or designees. Neither this provision, nor any other, shall be construed to state or imply that either the State or the Negotiating Committee is unauthorized to engage in settlement negotiations with Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participants without prior consent or contemporaneous participation of the other, or that either party is entitled to participate as an active or direct participant in settlement negotiations with the other. Rather, while the State's and Negotiation Committee's efforts to achieve worthwhile settlements are to be collaborative, incremental stages need not be so.

- 2. Any Master Settlement Agreement (MSA) shall be subject to the approval and jurisdiction of the Texas MDL Court.
- 3. As this is a Texas-specific effort, the Committee shall be Chaired by the Attorney General. However, the Attorney General, or his designees, shall endeavor to coordinate any publicity or other efforts to speak publicly with the other Committee Members.
- 4. The State of Texas, the Texas MDL Plaintiff's Steering Committee representatives, or the Political Subdivision representatives may withdraw

from coordinated Settlement discussions detailed in this Section upon 10 business days' written notice to the remaining Committee Members and counsel for any affected Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participant. The withdrawal of any Member releases the remaining Committee Members from the restrictions and obligations in this Section.

5. The obligations in this Section shall not affect any Party's right to proceed with trial or, within 30 days of the date upon which a trial involving that Party's claims against a specific Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participant is scheduled to begin, reach a case specific resolution with that particular Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participant.

F. Amendments

The Parties agree to make such amendments as necessary to implement the intent of this agreement.

Acknowledgment of Agreement

We, the undersigned, have participated in the drafting of the above Texas Term Sheet, including consideration based on comments solicited from Political Subdivisions. This document has been collaboratively drafted to maintain all individual claims while allowing the State and its Political Subdivisions to cooperate in exploring all possible means of resolution. Nothing in this agreement binds any party to any specific outcome. Any resolution under this document will require

acceptance by the State of Texas and a majority of the Litigating Political Subdivisions.

We, the undersigned, hereby accept the STATE OF TEXAS AND TEXAS POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS' OPIOID ABATEMENT FUND COUNCIL AND SETTLEMENT ALLOCATION TERM SHEET. We understand that the purpose of this Texas Term Sheet is to permit collaboration between the State of Texas and Political Subdivisions to explore and potentially effectuate earlier resolution of the Opioid Litigation against Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participants. We also understand that an additional purpose is to create an effective means of distributing any potential settlement funds obtained under this Texas Term Sheet between the State of Texas and Political Subdivisions in a manner and means that would promote an effective and meaningful use of the funds in abating the opioid epidemic throughout Texas.

EXHIBIT A

Opioid Abatement Fund (Texas) Settlement

Opioid Council

As part of the settlement agreement and upon its execution, the parties will form the Texas Opioid Council (Council) to establish the framework that ensures the funds recovered by Texas (through the joint actions of the Attorney General and the state's political subdivisions) are allocated fairly and spent to remediate the opioid crisis in Texas, using efficient and cost-effective methods that are directed to the hardest hit regions in Texas while also ensuring that all Texans benefit from prevention and recovery efforts.

I. Structure

The Council will be responsible for the processes and procedures governing the spending of the funds held in the Texas Abatement Fund, which will be approximately 70% of all funds obtained through settlement and/or litigation of the claims asserted by the State and its subdivisions in the investigations and litigation related to the manufacturing, marketing, distribution, and sale of opioids and related pharmaceuticals.

Money paid into the abatement fund will be held by an independent administrator, who shall be responsible for the ministerial task of releasing funds solely as authorized below by the Council, and accounting for all payments to and from the fund.

The Council will be formed when a court of competent jurisdiction enters an order settling the matter, including any order of a bankruptcy court. The Council's members must be appointed within sixty (60) days of the date the order is entered.

A. Membership

The Council shall be comprised of the following thirteen (13) members:

1. Statewide Members.

Six members appointed by the Governor and Attorney General to represent the State's interest in opioid abatement. The statewide members are appointed as follows:

- a. The Governor shall appoint three (3) members who are licensed health professionals with significant experience in opioid interventions;
- b. The Attorney General shall appoint three (3) members who are licensed professionals with significant experience in opioid incidences; and
- c. The Governor will appoint the Chair of the Council as a non-voting member. The Chair may only cast a vote in the event there is a tie of the membership.

2. Regional Members.

Six (6) members appointed by the State's political subdivisions to represent their designated Texas Health and Human Services Commission "HHSC" Regional Healthcare

Partnership (Regions) to ensure dedicated regional, urban, and rural representation on the Council. The regional appointees must be from either academia or the medical profession with significant experience in opioid interventions. The regional members are appointed as follows:

- a. One member representing Regions 9 and 10 (Dallas Ft-Worth);
- b. One member representing Region 3 (Houston);
- c. One member representing Regions 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 19 (West Texas);
- d. One member representing Regions 6, 7, 8, 16 (Austin-San Antonio);
- e. One member representing Regions 1, 2, 17, 18 (East Texas); and
- f. One member representing Regions 4, 5, 20 (South Texas).

B. Terms

All members of the Council are appointed to serve staggered two-year terms, with the terms of members expiring February 1 of each year. A member may serve no more than two consecutive terms, for a total of four consecutive years. For the first term, four (4) members (two (2) statewide and two (2) for the subdivisions) will serve a three-year term. A vacancy on the Council shall be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner as the original appointment. The Governor will appoint the Chair of the Council who will not vote on Council business unless there is a tie vote, and the subdivisions will appoint a Vice-Chair voting member from one of the regional members.

C. Governance

1. Administration

The Council is attached administratively to the Comptroller. The Council is an independent, quasi-governmental agency because it is responsible for the statewide distribution of the abatement settlement funds. The Council is exempt from the following statutes:

- a. Chapter 316 of the Government Code (Appropriations);
- b. Chapter 322 of the Government Code (Legislative Budget Board);
- c. Chapter 325 of the Government Code (Sunset);
- d. Chapter 783 of the Government Code (Uniform Grants and Contract Management);
- e. Chapter 2001 of the Government Code (Administrative Procedure);
- f. Chapter 2052 of the Government Code (State Agency Reports and Publications);
- g. Chapter 2261 of the Government Code (State Contracting Standards and Oversight);
- h. Chapter 2262 of the Government Code (Statewide Contract Management);

- i. Chapter 262 of the Local Government Code (Purchasing and Contracting Authority of Counties); and
- Chapter 271 of the Local Government Code (Purchasing and Contracting Authority of Municipalities, Counties, and Certain Other Local Governments).

2. Transparency

The Council will abide by state laws relating to open meetings and public information, including Chapters 551 and 552 of the Texas Government Code.

- i. The Council shall hold at least four regular meetings each year. The Council may hold additional meetings on the request of the Chair or on the written request of three members of the council. All meetings shall be open to the public, and public notice of meetings shall be given as required by state law.
- ii. The Council may convene in a closed, non-public meeting:
 - a. If the Commission must discuss:
 - 1. Negotiation of contract awards; and
 - 2. Matters specifically exempted from disclosure by federal and state statutes.
 - b. All minutes and documents of a closed meeting shall remain under seal, subject to release only order of a court of competent jurisdiction.

3. Authority

The Council does not have rulemaking authority. The terms of each Judgment, Master Settlement Agreement, or any Bankruptcy Settlement for Texas control the authority of the Council and the Council may not stray outside the bounds of the authority and power vested by such settlements. Should the Council require legal assistance in determining their authority, the Council may direct the executive director to seek legal advice from the Attorney General to clarify the issue.

D. Operation and Expenses

The independent administrator will set aside up to one (1) percent of the settlement funds for the administration of the Council for reasonable costs and expenses of operating the foregoing duties, including educational activities.

1. Executive Director

The Comptroller will employ the executive director of the Council and other personnel as necessary to administer the duties of the Council and carry out the functions of the Council. The executive director must have at least 10 years of experience in government or public administration and is classified as a Director V/B30 under the State Auditor's State Classification. The Comptroller will pay the salaries of the Council employees from the

one (1) percent of the settlement funds set aside for the administration of the Council. The Comptroller will request funds from the Texas Abatement Fund Point of Contact.

2. Travel Reimbursement

A person appointed to the Council is entitled to reimbursement for the travel expenses incurred in attending Council duties. A member of the Council may be reimbursed for actual expenses for meals, lodging, transportation, and incidental expenses in accordance with travel rates set by the federal General Services Administration.

II. Duties/Roles

It is the duty of the Council to determine and approve the opioid abatement strategies and funding awards.

A. Approved Abatement Strategies

The Council will develop the approved Texas list of abatement strategies based on but not limited to the existing national list of opioid abatement strategies (see attached Appendix A) for implementing the Texas Abatement Fund.

- 1. The Council shall only approve strategies which are evidence-informed strategies.
- 2. The Texas list of abatement strategies must be approved by majority vote. The majority vote must include a majority from both sides of the statewide members and regional members in order to be approved, e.g., at least four (4) of six (6) members on each side.

B. Texas Abatement Fund Point of Contact

The Council will determine a single point of contact called the Abatement Fund Point of Contact (POC) to be established as the sole entity authorized to receive requests for funds and approve expenditures in Texas and order the release of funds from the Texas Abatement Fund by the independent administrator. The POC may be an independent third party selected by the Council with expertise in banking or financial management. The POC will manage the Opioid Council Bank Account (Account). Upon a vote, the Council will direct the POC to contact the independent administrator to release funds to the Account. The Account is outside the State Treasury and not managed by any state or local officials. The POC is responsible for payments to the qualified entities selected by the Council for abatement fund awards. The POC will submit a monthly financial statement on the Account to the Council.

C. Auditor

An independent auditor appointed by the Council will perform an audit on the Account on an annual basis and report its findings, if any, to the Council.

D. Funding Allocation

The Council is the sole decision-maker on the funding allocation process of the abatement funds. The Council will develop the application and award process based on the parameters outlined below. An entity seeking funds from the Council must apply for funds; no funds will be awarded without an application. The executive director and personnel may assist the Council in gathering and compiling the applications for consideration; however, the Council members are the sole decision-makers of awards and funding determination. The Council will use the following processes to award funds:

- Statewide Funds. The Council will consider, adopt and approve the allocation methodology attached as Exhibit C, based upon population health data and prevalence of opioid incidences, at the Council's initial meeting. Adoption of such methodology will allow each Region to customize the approved abatement strategies to fit its communities' needs. The statewide regional funds will account for seventy-five (75) percent of the total overall funds, less the one (1) percent administrative expense described herein.
- 2. Targeted Funds. Each Region shall reserve twenty-five (25) percent of the overall funds, for targeted interventions in the specific Region as identified by opioid incidence data. The Council must approve on an annual basis the uses for the targeted abatement strategies and applications available to every Region, including education and outreach programs. Each Region without approved uses for the targeted funds from the Council, based upon a greater percentage of opioid incidents compared to its population, is subject to transfer of all or a portion of the targeted funds for that Region for uses based upon all Regions' targeted funding needs as approved by the Council on an annual basis.
- Annual Allocation. Statewide regional funds and targeted funds will be allocated on an
 annual basis. If a Region lapses its funds, the funds will be reallocated based on all
 Regions' funding needs.

E. Appeal Process

The Council will establish an appeal process to permit the applicants for funding (state or subdivisions) to challenge decisions by the Council-designated point of contact on requests for funds or expenditures.

- 1. To challenge a decision by the designated point of contact, the State or a subdivision must file an appeal with the Council within thirty (30) days of the decision. The Council then has thirty (30) days to consider and rule on the appeal.
- 2. If the Council denies the appeal, the party may file an appeal with the state district court of record where the final opioid judgment or Master Settlement Agreement is filed. The Texas Rules of Civil Procedure and Rules of Evidence will govern these proceedings. The Council may request representation from the Attorney General in these proceedings.

In making its determination, the state district court shall apply the same clear error standards contained herein that the Council must follow when rendering its decision.

- 3. The state district court will make the final decision and the decision is not appealable.
- 4. Challenges will be limited and subject to penalty if abused.
- 5. Attorneys' fees and costs are not recoverable in these appeals.

F. Education

The Council may determine that a percentage of the funds in the Abatement Fund from the targeted funds be used to develop an education and outreach program to provide materials on the consequences of opioid drug use, prevention and interventions. Any material developed will include online resources and toolkits for communities.
